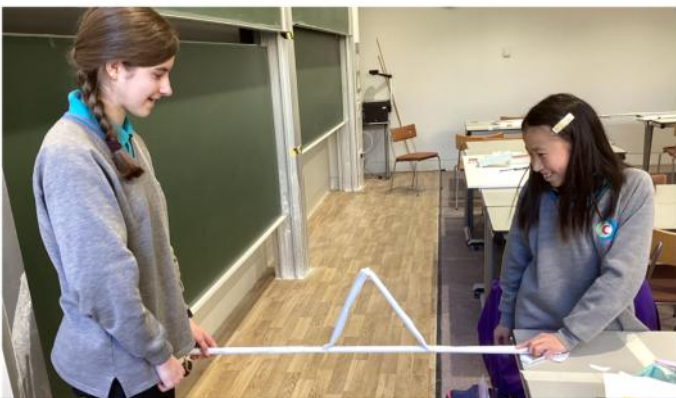

YEAR 7 GIRLS' FOOTBALL

The Year 7 girls' football team began their campaign at Comberton in a small tournament, where they faced two other schools. Despite the team coming together only on the day, the girls stood out with a strong performance, securing one win and one loss.

A few weeks later, their County Cup run began with a sunset fixture against Hinchingsbrooke School. The girls delivered a confident performance throughout, playing some lovely football and showing real defensive strength. Both teams produced excellent saves, but Cambourne stayed on top for most of the match. A final kick-of-the-game goal sealed a 5-0 victory for Cambourne and a place in the quarter-finals.

In the next round, Cambourne were drawn away to Sawtry Village Academy. This led to plenty of tactical discussions on the minibus journey. On arrival, the team learned Sawtry had an academy player in their squad, reinforcing the need to be at their best. The girls started strongly, creating several chances, though Sawtry responded with opportunities of their own. Cambourne pushed ahead to 2-1 and, despite sustained pressure from Sawtry, held on brilliantly to secure the win.

The semi-final saw Cambourne face Comberton Village College once again. Despite a determined performance, the girls fell short with a 3-1 loss, bringing their impressive cup run to an end.

A key highlight across the season was the team's outstanding teamwork, determination, encouragement, enthusiasm, and resilience in every fixture. Reaching the semi-finals of the County Cup is an achievement the girls should be incredibly proud of.

DESIGN VENTURA

Last week, our talented Design Ventura competition winners, Chloe, Hannah, Ola and Sofiia, had the incredible opportunity to travel to London for a behind-the-scenes look at how real products make their journey from idea to reality. Their winning creation—**Loopy Loom**, a portable loom designed to encourage the recycling and reuse of old clothing—took centre stage throughout the day as students collaborated with industry professionals to refine their product for manufacturing.

The day began with an exciting visit to **CNC Projects Studio**, where students were invited into the world of digital fabrication. Welcomed by industry experts, they explored early prototypes of their product and gained first-hand insight into how design concepts are transformed using advanced technologies. One of the highlights came when the team watched a CNC machine produce a component of their loom right before their eyes—a moment that made the design process feel more real than ever.

Following this, the group met with the product’s designer to finalise decisions on both the structure of Loopy Loom and its packaging. Students discussed materials, durability, user experience, and the visual identity of their product. These conversations allowed them to see how creative choices must balance usability, functionality, and manufacturability—key considerations in professional design.

This unique opportunity gave our students an invaluable, real-world understanding of the full manufacturing and design process. From initial concept sketches to production-ready decisions, they experienced each step alongside the professionals who bring products to life. It was a once-in-a-lifetime chance to immerse themselves in the creative industry and see how their ideas can shape the future of sustainable design.

The day ended with excitement, inspiration, and a renewed sense of possibility.

Loopy Loom is well on its way to becoming a finished product and will be available for purchase at the Design Museum shop later on this year.

YEAR 10 BOYS' FOOTBALL

First Round: Cambourne 4:1 Netherhall

The lads started with a scintillating win over Netherhall, with goals from Henry M, 2 from Theo P — including an absolute screamer — and 1 from Luke C. The first half ended 1–1 with goals from both sides. In the second half the boys turned it on and scored 3 great goals in quick succession, and the game was dead and buried by the final whistle.

Second Round: Cambourne 3:3 Bottisham (4–2 on penalties)

The boys started off slow, conceding 2 soft goals. A moment of magic turned it around with an absolute pile driver from Theo P. 2–1 at half time, something to fight for. But yet again the boys started slow, conceding another — 3–1. Ten minutes to go, a quick double substitution from the gaffer, bringing on Will A and Mustafa A. Instant impact: a ball over the top from Mustafa A and Will A pounced on the end of it — a tidy finish, 3–2.

Last-minute corner ball, everyone is up for it. A brilliant ball from Mustafa A, headed by the opposition player, fell at Jack J's feet and he volleys it into the top corner. A moment for the ages — 3–3, last kick of the game.

Now penalties. Two fantastic saves from Roman PS and a brilliant penalty from Mustafa A and the game was over. A great comeback and the boys are through to the Semi-Finals.

Semi-Finals: Chesterton 2:2 Cambourne (2–4 on penalties)

The lads started off fast with a great ball over the top and Will A was in behind the back line and lobbed the keeper with a cheeky finish, 0–1 to Cambourne. Then the game turned into a cagey affair; Chesterton's star player took it past a few of our players and his shot hit the post and unluckily hit off Rory W and went in our own net. An unlucky setback — 1–1.

Chesterton are back on the attack — a shot from the edge of the box whistles past Roman PS, a great finish — 2–1 Chesterton. The boys are losing at halftime.

The second half was a bit of a dog fight: constant pressure from Chesterton, a couple of outstanding saves from Roman PS, and the boys have a lifeline. Finally, an opening — Henry M gets through on the right and swings a cross into Will A, and he bundles it across the line. 2–2.

The ref blows for full-time — 2–2 — penalties again. Yet again Roman PS makes a fantastic save and their player smacks it against the bar. Mustafa A, again to win it, smashes it home. The boys are through to the Final!!



The Final: Cambourne 3:0 Cottenham – Newmarket Town FC

The final started off scrappy — a great goal-line clearance from Ronnie S kept the game at 0–0 going into halftime. Pressure again from Cottenham — a fantastic save from Roman PS to tip it onto the post, still 0–0. A scrappy corner from Cottenham falls to their captain inside the 6-yard box, and he smashes it against the bar. A let-off for the boys.

Chance for Henry M — he smashes it into the side netting and the boys are 1–0 up. This saw the shift of the game; the lads turned it on. Ronnie S wins a free kick on the right-hand side, Theo P crosses it into the box and Henry M rises highest to head it home. 2–0, the boys are in fantasy land.

Relentless pressure from Cambourne — Theo P gets the ball on the edge and cracks one on the volley and it whistles past the goalkeeper. 3–0, game over. The rest of the game the boys kept pushing for more, but it just didn't happen. The lads cruised to the final whistle — Cambourne 3, Cottenham 0. Absolute scenes — District Final Winners, U15 Champions.

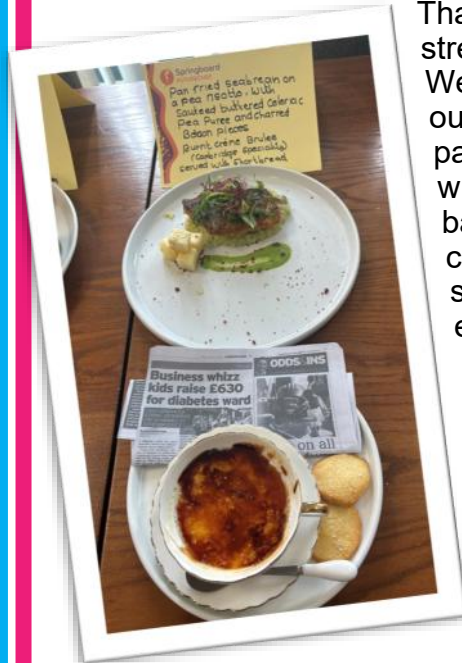

LIBRARY LATEST

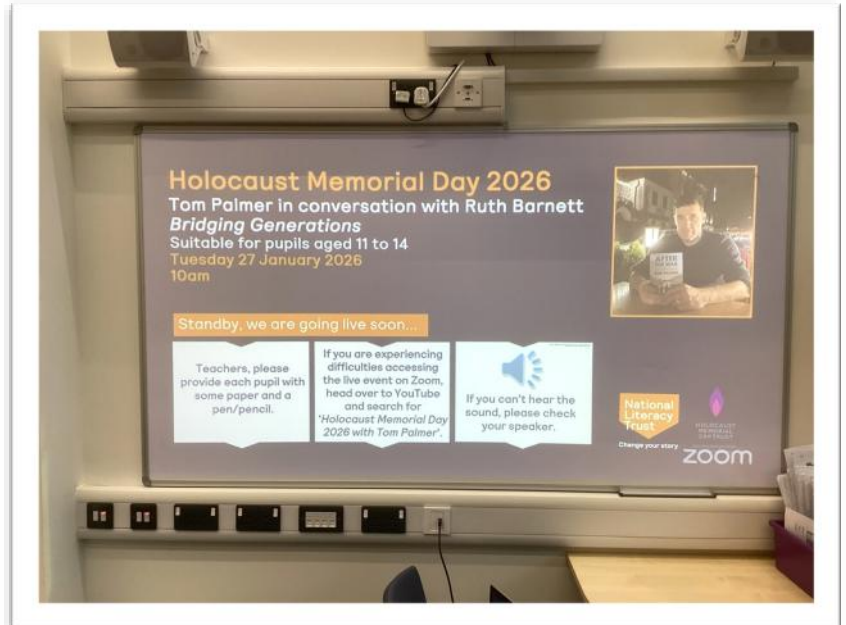


January may be grey and bleak outside, but students have received a warm welcome as they keep themselves busy and occupied in the library.

HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY

Holocaust Memorial Day was marked on 27th January – the anniversary of the liberation of the Nazi concentration and death camp Auschwitz-Birkenau. On and around this day, schools, communities, and faith groups across the UK come together in national and local events to commemorate those who became victims of the Nazis and their collaborators, as well as victims of more recent genocides. It is also a time to reflect on the contemporary relevance of the Holocaust.



This year, students from Years 7, 8 and 9 joined a live-streamed event in the library with award-winning writer Tom Palmer, author of *After the War*. He was joined by his special guest, Ruth Barnett, and together they discussed her life and experience as a displaced person growing up in England in the 1940s and 1950s. They also explored why it remains vital to keep sharing her story and how her experiences help bridge the generations. Students were invited to submit questions to the speakers. Those from CamVC asked:

- *What did she (Ruth) teach?* (Dev)
- *After teaching, what did you do next to help?* (name not recorded)
- *Did you know what was happening in Auschwitz?* (Manuel)
- *What were British attitudes to German refugees?* (Eveline)

A final question asked: *“What can we do now to help refugees?”*

Ruth responded, *“Be kind. Talk to refugees, they are human beings. Make them welcome. Show compassion.”*

A message for us all.

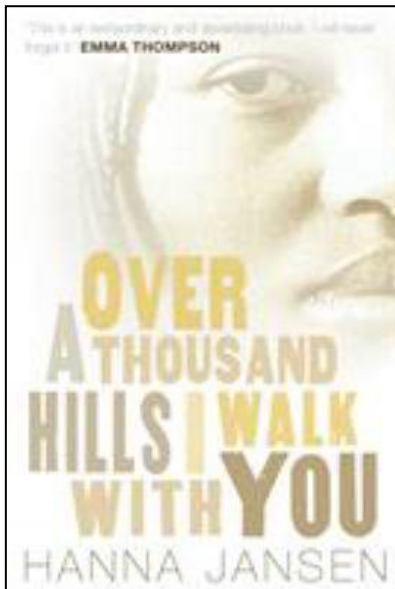
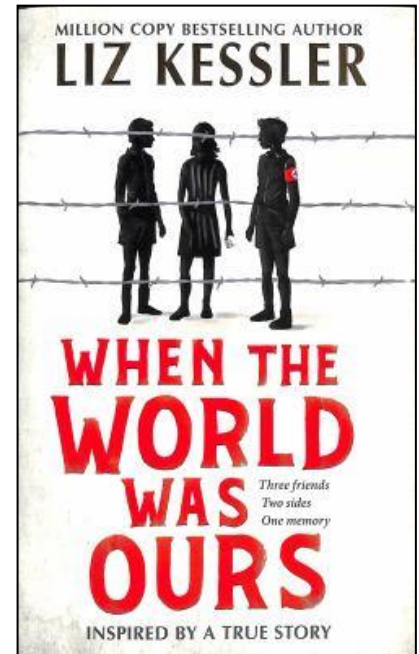


WHEN THE WORLD WAS OURS by Liz Kessler

Three friends. One memory.
Vienna, 1936.

Three young friends—Leo, Elsa, and Max—spend a perfect day together, unaware that Europe is descending into darkness and that they will soon be cruelly torn apart. Their lives lead them across Germany, England, Prague, and Poland—will they ever find their way back to one another? And if they do, will they want to?

Inspired by a true story, *When the World Was Ours* is a powerful and heartbreaking novel that shows how love, family, and friendship can still offer glimmers of hope, even in the most hopeless of times. (Available from the school library and on SORA)



OVER A THOUSAND HILLS I WALK WITH YOU by Hanna Jansen

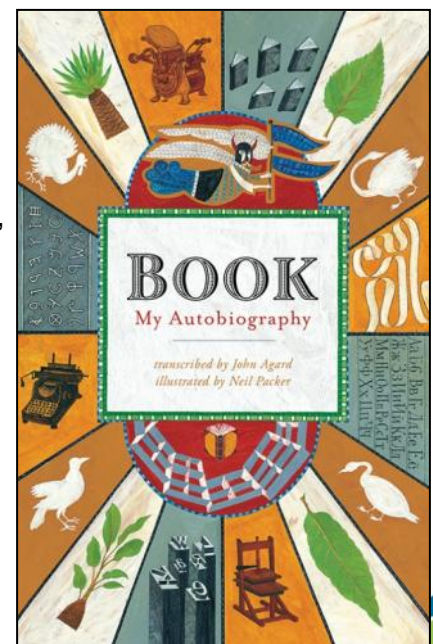
Before that fateful April day, Jeanne lived the life of a typical Rwandan girl. She bickered with her little sister, went to school, and teased her brother. Then, in one horrifying night, everything changed. Political turmoil unleashed a wave of violence against the Tutsi ethnic group. Jeanne's family, all Tutsis, fled their home and tried desperately to reach safety.

They did not succeed. As the only survivor of her family's massacre, Jeanne witnessed unspeakable acts. This haunting story was told to Jeanne's adoptive mother, who brings to life the events of the 1994 Rwandan genocide with unforgettable clarity. (Available from the school library – Year 9+)

BOOK by John Agard

Books contain countless tales—but what if Book told its own story? From clay tablets to e-readers, this is a quirky and memorable journey through the history of the written word.

One of humankind's greatest creations, the book gains its own witty, idiosyncratic voice as it recounts the evolution from papyrus scrolls to medieval manuscripts to modern print. Along the way, Book reflects on the alphabet, ancient libraries (known to Egyptians as "the healing place of the soul"), and even book burning. With bold black-and-white illustrations by Neil Packer, *Book* is a captivating nonfiction work by one of England's leading poets. (Available from the school library)



SIXTH FORM

This half term, our Year 13 students have had their sights firmly set on UCAS, with over 80% of the cohort submitting applications to universities across the UK and abroad. Nearly 70% of students applied to one or more Russell Group institutions, and we are thrilled to see a steady stream of offers arriving from universities such as Sheffield, Cardiff, York and Leeds. We have also received excellent feedback from admissions tutors, many of whom have praised the high quality of our students' personal statements and the strength of their references. It is clear that all their hard work — and the guidance from staff — has truly paid off.

Students have applied for a wide variety of courses, reflecting the diverse interests and ambitions within the year group. Engineering leads the way as the most popular choice, closely followed by Law, Computer Science and Psychology. With offers secured, attention now turns to the all-important final push for exam success as students work to achieve the results needed for their next steps.

In Year 12, students have now completed their first set of formal assessments, giving them valuable experience of the demands of Sixth Form study. Alongside their academic work, the year group has been deeply engaged in shaping the future of the student community through the election of the new Student Council. This year's council will be led by Co-Presidents Holly W and Charlie A, who successfully navigated a challenging selection process of interviews, hustings and formal presentations to earn both the student vote and the confidence of the senior leadership team. They are joined by a strong team of Vice-Presidents from a wide range of previous schools — a wonderful reflection of the diverse backgrounds and perspectives that make our Sixth Form community so vibrant.

We are also eagerly looking ahead to the next Sixth Form Showcase on the 25th and 26th of February. Rehearsals are well underway, and the standard of performance is already shaping up to be outstanding. Tickets are now available — we encourage everyone to join us for what promises to be two fantastic evenings celebrating the creativity and talent of our students.

Meanwhile, preparations for the future continue as we welcome the Class of '28. Year 11 students from across the county have been attending guidance interviews, exploring their subject choices, and gaining a sense of the opportunities that await them in our Sixth Form. Their enthusiasm, curiosity, and ambition have been wonderful to see, and it already feels as though they will be a cohort every bit as determined and hardworking as our current students.

There has been a real buzz around the Sixth Form this term, with students at every stage focusing intently on their futures — whether that means university, apprenticeships, performances, leadership roles or academic milestones. It is a privilege to work alongside them and to celebrate their achievements as they take their next steps.

We look forward to welcoming all students back after half term on Monday 23rd February, refreshed, recharged, and ready to embrace the second half of the academic year with energy and purpose.
